
APPRENTICESHIPS

- An apprenticeship is a hands-on training program for people who want to work in a skilled trade and who enjoy learning by doing.
- About 90% of apprenticeship training is provided in the workplace by employers. The remaining 10% involves classroom instruction usually by a college or approved training organization.
- The Four Main Trade Sectors are: Construction, Service, Industrial & Motive Power

PATHWAYS TO APPRENTICESHIP TRAINING:

1. TRADITIONAL

Once you find an employer to hire you as a trainee, you would register with the Ontario College of Trade. The College of Trades will set you up with a community college or approved training organization for the in-school part of your training. Once you complete your required hours of training, the school component and pass the Ontario certification exam, you will be a certified skilled worker in Ontario.



2. PRE-APPRENTICESHIP TRAINING

Apply to a <u>Co-Op Diploma Apprenticeship</u> or <u>Techniques</u> Program at a College. In these programs you receive basic training in the specific trade and hopefully make a connection with a Journey Person.

Once you complete your program, you would then continue with a traditional apprenticeship.
